

I want to extend a special thank you to our Federation Board of Directors for all the dancing joy they helped create in 2014. The last Federation event was the November Officer's Ball in Livermore. The Officers Ball attracted dancers from all over (even Southern California) for an afternoon and evening of dance. 



FEDERATION VIDEO CHALLENGE

(Folk Dance Federation of California)

PURPOSE

The purpose of the "Federation Video Challenge" is to:

- 1. Raise funds for the Federation to promote international folk dance.
- 2. Add to the collection of internet videos of interest to Federation members.
- 3. Promote the posting of internet dance videos which do not yet exist on the internet.
- 4. Promote and honor dancers and/or musicians from our dance communities.

The essence of this fundraising challenge is simple: In exchange for a Challenger agreeing to donate a certain dollar amount to the Federation, the Challenged person agrees to post a requested dance video on the internet. To help think about your video challenge, consider the following example of our first "Federation Video Challenge."

I, Memo Keswick (Chico), challenge John Nicoara (San Francisco Bay Area) to post on the internet a video which clearly shows him and others doing the Atanas Kolarovski dance known as Cetvorka. John is requested to lead the dance and have at least 4 dancers immediately behind him who know the dance well. If John chooses to accept the challenge and successfully posts the resulting video, I will donate \$30.00 to the Folk Dance Federation of California.

CHALLENGE DETAILS

The details of what kind of dance/music video is requested is left to the discussion between the Challenger and the Challenged. However, the Federation does have some general recommendations about the Challenge.

- * Challenges can be between individuals, between clubs, or between an individual and a club. Challenges are not limited to Northern California.
- * The Federation greatly appreciates Challenges for videos of dances NOT already found on internet, but this is not a requirement.
- * It is recommended that the participants work out *in advance* the details of exactly what the Challenger expects from the video.
- * The Federation asks for common courtesy in all discussions between a Challenger and Challenged. The process is meant to be enjoyable, not stressful.
- * As appropriate, Federation may post Challenge details on its website.
- * The Federation must be assured that both Challenger and Challenged have agreed to the Challenge <u>before</u> the Federation will post the Challenge on its website. Please e-mail the Federation President at president@folkdance.com to acknowledge the accepted Challenge, and later when it is agreed that the Challenge has been successfully met.
- * You will need to provide the names of the participants and the city/club where the filming is done.
- * There is no specific amount required for the Challenge. The amount to be donated to the Federation upon the successful completion of the Challenge could be more or less

than the example above, and is to be determined by the participants. If requested, the Federation acknowledgement of a Challenge donation would not provide the specific amount of the donation.

* Don't worry if you've been challenged, but don't know how to post videos. Making the video is more important, and posting your video may be easier than you think. You may learn to do it yourself, or you may find a family member, friends, or colleagues to assist you. The Federation is also willing to help you.

VIDEO CREATION

Quality videos are important to the Federation. The Federation will leave discussions about video quality up to the Challenger and Challenged, but the Federation reserves the right to not post videos on its website.

- * Try to find an experienced videographer. This need not be a professional, but it should be someone who has had some time behind a video camera.
- * Think about where to video. Perhaps a local dance teacher or weekly dance group will be happy to film your video during a class or local dance event. You might prefer a beautiful outdoor setting.
- * Cameras record best with good lighting. If filming indoors, having all available lights on produces better results. Avoid having lights directly behind dancers. Even windows with sun shining behind the dance line can severely impact video quality.
- * Having the camera set up right next to the speaker system can improve sound quality tremendously, is especially helpful in blocking out any unwanted background noise.
- * The camera should be stationary, on a table or tripod to avoid a shaky result.
- * The video should be of a small group of dancers who know the dance well.
- * There are many video file formats used these days. Cameras often don't offer choices of recording format and what you record in may not be appropriate for posting. If necessary, family, friends, colleagues, or the Federation can help convert the file to one used in internet videos.

POSTING VIDEO TO IINTERNET

The Federation has some general recommendations for posting your video on the internet.

- * The finished video can be posted on a Youtube or another website belonging to the Challenger, the Challenged, the videographer, or the Federation. The video is to be made available for viewing by the general user of the internet.
- * If you're not interested in posting your video on Youtube or another online website, ask others for ideas on who might post it for you. The Federation is always willing to help you post your video.

CONCLUSION

The Federation hopes this "Federation Video Challenge" will be warmly received as a valued Federation fundraiser and that it will provide both incentive and support for promoting the legacy and viewing availability of our beloved dances. Hopefully this fundraiser will inspire community members to have fun, share dances or music adventures with others, and honor our dance leaders.

As with any new fundraising project there is room for improvement or clarity on how the fundraiser works. Please contact any member of the Federation Board of Directors with your feedback or questions.

Memorium

Marcel Vinokur November 14, 2014

Czechoslovakian-born Marcel Vinokur, who came to America at the age of 13, has long been known as one of the West Coast's foremost authorities on Balkan-Israeli dancing. For Marcel, it all began in the 1950s when he was studying engineering physics at Cornell University. It was there that a dormitory friend managed to talk him into attending a folk dance class session. As Marcel later recalled, "I was hooked the very first time." It was a revelation to discover the magic of line dancing – that it encourages dancers to perform together as a unit.

After receiving his Ph.D. in aeronautical engineering from Princeton, Marcel came to Palo Alto to work as a research scientist at Lockheed. While in graduate school at Princeton, Marcel had found the time to teach a folk dance class. And so, soon after coming to California, he began teaching at the Palo Alto Recreation Center and quickly grew his class to over 40 regular dancers. It was at this time that he began to concentrate on the combination known as Balkan-Israeli – a term that he coined.

Recalling that his college dance group had held special get-togethers – hikes, camping, and such, Marcel and his wife Kathy in the late 1960s began annual May folkdance campouts in Yosemite, often attracting 80 or more dancers for hiking in small groups and a massive folk dance potluck and party in Yosemite afterward. Neither rain nor snow ever deterred Marcel and his dedicated dancer campers.

About this same time, the late 1960s, Marcel moved his class to the Menlo Park Recreation Center just as the interest in folk dancing was about to explode. There were festivals and workshops introducing exciting new dances, and the popularity of folk music brought new young dancers into the folk dance scene. Marcel expanded his Menlo Park classes, having a double class - beginning and intermediate - on Tuesdays, and an advanced class on Wednesdays. With the interest in folk dancing at fever pitch, Marcel expanded once again, this time adding a Monday class at Foothill College in Los Altos, a Thursday class at the College of San Mateo, and a Friday class at UC Santa Cruz. It didn't end even there. Soon he was conducting weekend folk dancing retreats at a Japanese teagarden facility in Saratoga where dedicated dancers could concentrate on mastering the most complex of Balkan dances. All of this continued throughout the 1970s and 1980s.

From the very beginning Marcel regularly attended a multitude of folk dance festivals and workshops, constantly adding to and expanding his repertoire. These included AMAN in Los Angeles in the 1970s, the annual May Berkeley Folk Dance Festival in the 1970s and 1980s, the June Israeli Folk Dance Institute in San Luis Obispo in the 1970s and early 1980s, the July Folk Dance Camp in Stockton, the November Kolo Festival in San Francisco, and numerous workshops sponsored by local dance clubs.

Beginning in the 1990s Marcel noted that interest in folk dancing had leveled off. Fewer new young dancers were coming into the classes; many had married, started families, and stopped coming on a regular basis; and several of the festivals – AMAN, Berkeley, San Luis Obispo – had come to an end.

Even so, Marcel persevered, still teaching his Tuesday class well into the Millennium and continuing with his monthly parties at the Menlo Park Recreation Center where many of those who had been his students over these past 50 years would drop in to renew acquaintances and join in their favorite dances. New Year's Eve, in particular, continued to draw a wonderful mix of old and new dancers, all of whom were delighted to greet old friends and revel in the fact that – like Brigadoon – it was all just as they had remembered it.

For his nearly 50 years of dedicated teaching, Marcel, once called The Pied Piper of Menlo Park, will always be remembered as the Bay Area's revered master of Balkan-Israeli folk dancing.





What Marcel Knew

Marcel Vinokur changed my life. He was my friend and my first folk dance teacher. In the summer of 1974, a friend suggested that we walk from our homes in Menlo Park to the nearby community center to check out a folk dance class. I had never seen or heard of folk dancing. I was captivated by the music, the dance movements, and the smiles on the faces of the dancers. I became hooked. I started dancing at Marcel's Tuesday and Monday classes, going to his workshops, his Saturday and NYE's parties and then to various other dance groups and dance camps. I met people from all over the world and made lifelong friends. Over the years I came to know Marcel through our many conversations at festivals, potlucks, weekend events, camps, carpools to workshops, and while carrying his cases of records up the hill at a local college. I picked his brain. He was an information-junkie, a detail man, a fact-finder and a community builder. We talked about our families, friends and science careers. His knowledge and memory astounded me. He was interested in others and inquisitive about diverse subjects. He could tell you where hundreds of folk dance friends worked, volunteered, studied, traveled, or were born and raised. He could tell me if I knew (or had learned) such-and-such a dance. He was wrong only once that I recall...at a party at a North/South teachers seminar, I jumped up to do the Scottish dance Bratach Bana, and he told me I didn't know it. He didn't know that I had learned the dance elsewhere. That evening I had fun chiding him for missing that detail.

The real story, however, is that Marcel was well aware of the true essence and significance of folk dance. More than the steps and beyond the details and intricacies of the dances, rhythms and music, Marcel knew that folk dancing was the door to cultural awareness, socialization, and a rich, joyful life. He knew it was all about connections, community and friendships.

He knew the reason we were smiling.

We got the sad news yesterday about Marcel's passing. It's hard to believe. He was such a giant, so influential, in the Bay Area folk dance scene--a standard-bearer. He marked many of us. I imagine you all took time out at the Officers' Ball yesterday to announce it and for Ist reminiscences. It must be a terrible shock for Kathy. Our dancing hearts, brains & feet are with her & the community. —Carol Toffaleti and Bill Croft

I too am stunned and deeply saddened by this news. The folk-dance community is huge, and a lot of people come and go from your circle of friends, but Marcel was one of those people that everyone stayed in contact with forever. This is a great loss to our community.

Marcel's advanced class probably had the largest repertoire anywhere. We had over half a dozen Bulgarian Kopanicas alone. He was famous for his copious notes taken at camps and workshops (too bad nobody else could read his handwriting).

Memoriam

Marcel Vinokur

Born February 16, 1929, Ostrava, Czechoslovakia. Died November 14, 2014, Palo Alto, California.

Marcel Vinokur was a compassionate man, and an avowed Humanist who expanded upon his orthodox Jewish heritage and upbringing in favor of a secular philosophy that espoused optimism in humankind to make this world a better place. He was born to a Polish mother and Ukrainian/Russian father in what is now the Czech Republic, and was raised a Jew. He witnessed the Nazi takeover of Czechoslovakia in 1939, mere weeks before he and his parents fled to Le Havre and sailed on a steam liner to New York City, where he gained his life-long passion for subways, baseball, and folk dancing.

Some of his ardent supporters openly proclaim Marcel to be a 'true renaissance man.' He studied Physics at Cornell Umversity, eventually earning his PhD in Quantum Physics from Princeton Univeristy during Einstein's tenure there. Marcel moved to California to work with Lockheed, settled in Palo Alto in the early '60s, and later worked for NASA Ames Research Center at Moffett Field. In fact, he worked at his Ames office the day he died. His scientific contributions included NASA's manned space program and co-authored theorems in fluid mechanics.

He was an internationally recognized master instructor and historian of Balkan and Israeli folk dance. He was instrumental in building a large folk dance community on the San Francisco Peninsula through his 60+ years of teaching up to four classes a week at Foothills College, at UC Santa Cruz, and in Menlo Park. The annual calendar for the 'Menlo Park Folk Dancers' (as his following was called) included monthly Saturday night folk dance parties, monthly retreats at a private Japanese tea garden in Saratoga, as well as annual Mother's Day dance weekends in Yosemite Valley (including this past year), and New Year's Eve parties back home.

With his wife, Kathy, Marcel was an avid supporter of the Arts, ranging from ACT in San Francisco to the Redwood Symphony and the Lively Arts at Stanford.

Marcel was a political activist who met his surviving wife Kathryn in Palo Alto during the campaign to block Oregon Expressway back in the early 1960s. Ever on the go, he was an Alpine hiker, with his last Alpine trek in Austria and Germany in 2003, age 74.

Marcel is survived by his wife and son, two stepsons and eight grandchildren.

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Eye on Dance by Eileen

Around Town Fall 2014

What do you do when your local sports team (Go A's) has already lost, but most of the Bay Area was glued to game seven of the World Series? Go to Ashkenaz...for an evening of Klezmer music with The Jubilee Klezmer Ensemble, dance teacher Bruce Bierman and his assistant (and new husband — mazel tov) Gilberto Melendez. The wearing of Halloween costunies was encouraged, but only a few people wore them. I semi-wimped out and only wore my devil ears and ghostly socks — after all, I didn't want to go too orange and black (Giant's colors!).

Accordionist Sonia Tubridy played for us as Bruce taught the basics of Klezmer dancing while giving lots of interesting background information. It was a small but enthusiastic crowd. After the teaching, the band played for a few hours, including some classic Israeli dances. I was surprised to learn a third part in Zemer Atik, where people paired up for a short time. Unfortunately, most people left when the band took a short break. What they missed after the break were fun renditions of some familiar songs (like Bei Mir Bist Du Schein) in the rich tones of vocalist Alby Kass, and great clarinet solos by Paul Alexander, ably backed by Mark Peabody on the bass. The group plays frequently around the Bay Area, so keep a look out for them and connect with your Eastern European roots.

November Balkan BacchanaI

When the Starry Plough first started doing the monthly Bacchanal a few years ago on Thursday nights, an optimistic handful of dancers showed up and hoped there would be enough people to form a short line to weave through a few pockets of swaying hipsters. Now on Friday nights, the Bacchanal has really evolved. I got there an hour early to eat dinner, a time when historically one had the pick of any table. But that night I barely found a place to sit. Luckily, a few friends got there even earlier and I squeezed in with them. (Delicious pulled pork and crispy fries – but bring mints – lots of garlie!).

If you are not familiar with the Balkan nights, there are always three bands, advertized as starting at 9:00, 10:00, and 11:00 pm. Has that schedule ever been kept? No. Musicians seem to have their own time. So, be prepared for a late night. The first band was the Plovdiv Party Bus. The dancers got on the bus! So to speak. All the expected dances were played, from pajdusko, to racenica, pravo, lesnoto and more. Enthusiastic lines snaked around the intimate dance floor with lots of dancers of all ages. I think every decade starting in the 30-somethings and up was represented. Might I add there were plenty of men. The energy started high and went up exponentially with each band.

The second band was the ever-popular Agapi Mou and they brought out all the usual Greek dance enthusiasts from the Bay Area, as well as a local group of young Greek people, who were quite energetic dancers. How can I paint this scene? Waiters balancing trays of beer, wine, and food trying to squeeze through the dancers. Lines of experienced dancers leading and encouraging many new "let's try this - it looks like fun" dancers, all trying to make paths through the

They are a Klezmer and Balkan Band, playing Moldovan, Romanian, Ukrainian, Greek/Macedonian, and Serbian music. I was trying to remember anything Bruce Bierman taught a few weeks ago—come on brain. Who cares? Just dance. The floor emptied out after some of the Greek aficionados left and I just let myself go, waltzing at times, or just moving to the music. There was an amazing guitar guest during the set who was excellent, but wound up being a bit of a buzz kill as he wasn't very dance-y. Fortunately, the band started up again after his set and played until 1:00 am. Wow. Great night.

Officer's Ball

The very next day was the Officer's Ball, a Federation Event. The annual party and institute was a completely different experience from the previous might, but not any less enjoyable. Through the efforts of the Folkdance Federation and its many dedicated presenters, I see a bright future for community folk dancing and am proud to be a member. Though Julie Killeen and I are not actively teaching dance at the moment, our impromptu Bulgarian moves at Rock and Roll Concerts have provided us an opportunity to spread the word. It should be noted that large efforts to recruit new members to a group usually result with a small response; response may not take place immediately but it will happen.

Danish dancing in Solvang

Recent trips with partner, Steve Rivas, included experiencing two very different genres of folk dancing.

In late August/early September in the Hawaiian Islands we scheduled a day-long visit to the Polynesian Cultural Center on Oahu, an hour drive northwest of Honolulu. This theme park of simulated Pacific island tropical villages features arts and crafts exhibits and demonstrations. One hula program displayed how restricted was island dancing before stringed instruments were introduced; foot-stomping, grunting, slapping to drumbeats. The evening show is a 2+ hour elaborately costumed spectacle with a cast of hundreds singing and dancing patterns--mucho macho for the men, graceful and swaying for the women--from the Hawaiian islands to as far south as the Maoris of New Zealand. It's an energetic extravaganza but near the end of the show we both felt the relative limitations of island choreography exhibited. The PCC is definitely worth a visit and you cannot but be impressed with the genial staff and performers mostly made up of students from the adjoining Mormon university.

We had our first brief look at Solvang last year when driving to Statewide in Santa Barbara. This is a town of about 5,000 founded in 1911 by Danish immigrants who decided to escape the climate of the upper Midwest. It has evolved into a meter-less, accommodating, somewhat faux taste of Denmark with windmills, buildings/architecture that reflect Danish provincial style, monuments (Little Mermaid, Hans Christian Anderson) and a comforting abundance of pastry shops.

This year we decided to attend Solvang's annual Danish Days Festival in September, whetted by comments made by Craig and Cindy Blackstone who are among Changs' members that have previously experienced the festival. We found the festival an easy-going, unpretentious, pleasant weekend of events. Those included simple opening & closing ceremonies, small-scale parades, two Danish men playing/singing vintage and modern Danish songs, local and Fresno Danish dancers, "The Great Danes" band, beer & wine outdoor garden, two street market shopping fairs, outdoor apple pancake breakfast/pancake eating contest, "Kids Korner" play & rest area. A "lighter side" organ/piano concert Saturday afternoon at the historic Bethany Lutheran Church was a thorough delight. All events are centrally located easily walked from any town hostelry.

The music and dancing goes on daily in the streets to recorded selections on a casual schedule but with live music in the evenings in a pavilion on a wooden floor. Similar to Dutch dancing I've seen, Danish folk dancing seems uncomplicated, Even moderately skilled folk dancers could easily join in after watching one or two sequences of most dances performed. Though encouraged, very few adults ventured to join the performing dancers. The folk dancers would go out into the audience but preferably chose children. Adult afternoon bystanders and evening audience members were content to watch even when approached. All that was needed to change that atmosphere would have been a few visiting international folk dancers. May I suggest you think about doing just that-dance, stroll about picturesque Solvang, savor the array of pastries and, then, dance some more.

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Sandy's Čačak

(Serbian)

This dance was learned by Sandy Clemmer in New York after WWII in a Serbian dance club. Sandy brought it to the Santa Rosa area after moving there. In time, it made its way around the North Bay. It is commonly done to an old cacak recording which was provided on a CD at the 2014 Folk Dance Federation N. Officers Ball in Livermore, where it was presented by Gary Anderson.

Music: 2/4 Meter Any fast, peppy čačak

Formation: Short lines with belt hold, facing center. An alternative hold for those without belts is hands down in V-position. There should be no mixed handhold lines.

Steps & Styling: Peppy, with an underlying bounciness.
All the crossing steps should be with the knee raised as much as comfortable for men, ladies more subdued.

Take special note of the lifts, if they aren't done the dancer will get ahead of the music.
