

President's Message

The winter holidays are a special time of celebration for all steeped in age-old family and community traditions. As one might expect, it isn't a true tradition until far more people enjoy and continue a custom than there are that live to remember when it started or why. In this month's special message we'll ex-



amine some of the amazing winter holiday folk dance traditions for cultures about the world.

Romania is rich in traditions and superstitions. A few still persist among modern Romanians but many of the old traditions can be discovered in remote villages in the countryside. Winter folk traditions are many, and village caroling is an exciting part. There is the simple caroling, which involves only people singing, and there are the typical village carols which include dancing and more complex performances. The latter type of Romanian traditional carols include masked dances of beasts and creatures that "visit" the town to wish it well in the new year.

One such Romanian carol dance includes the Mascatii (the Masked People). The dancers wear hideous masks and large bells to try to scare off the old year. They dance and sing and generally make a lot of noise. The tradition goes back hundreds of years and the masks used on this occasion are hand crafted by traditional craftsmen.

Another special carol dance is called Capra (the Goat). In this case, it features one or more Romanian carolers dressed up as goats that dance to a pipe tune.

The bear dance, Ursul, is one of the most spectacular traditional mask dances found in Romanian villages of Bucovina and Moldova. The event takes place annually between Christmas and New Year's. The bears banish demons from houses and farmyards in hopes of a prosperous new year. In the bear dance, the animal dies but revives, in a symbolic dramatization of the mythical rebirth of nature. They're accompanied by drummers, pipers, and a singing "bear tamer." The costumes worn by locals in the dance are actual bearskins with large blood red tassels tied aside each bear ear. The bears rock their head in rhythm and stomp sideways in group with their companion bears in the snowy street. They intend to look fierce but the onlookers all know it is a time of celebration when the bears come to dance.

The dance owes its origins to the time when the local Roma would descend into towns from the forests in which they lived, leading with them real bears. Townsfolk would pay to have the bear cubs walk up and down their backs believing it a cure for backache. Older bears would be made to "dance" by being placed on hot metal plates so that they would hop up and down. The practice continued as late as the 1930s but no one can remember how they went from real bears to people dressed as bears. In recent years a ban on bear hunting escalated the price of a single bearskin up to \$2200 so

that most Roma eventually sold their skins never to replace

Spain is a very festive time at Christmas. On Christmas Eve, as the stars come out, tiny oil lamps are lit in every house. After midnight mass and Christmas dinner, streets fill with dancers and onlookers. The Spanish have a traditional Christmas dance called Jota danced to guitars and castanets. Its words and music has been handed down for hundreds of years.

North Americans typically celebrate Christmas on December 25th. However, Peru as well as other South American countries such as Venezuela and Boliva, celebrate primarily on Christmas Eve instead.

After dinner, many Peruvians take to the streets to greet friends and neighbors. After the children finish opening their presents, it is time for them to head to bed. The adults then push away the furniture, roll up the carpet, and put on their dance shoes to salsa the night away. These parties can last into early morning. The following day, December 25 is uneventful in comparison.

In Scotland on Christmas Day, people sometimes make big bonfires and dance around them to bagpipe music. Elsewhere in the world some people would prefer the custom be to toss the bagpipes into the bonfire before dancing.

It is hard to imagine a community that would not celebrate the special festivals of winter with dance. It seems fitting that in recent years we have revived our own tradition of dance celebrations on Christmas and New Year's here in the Bay Area. Look for the calendar of events in this issue or on folkdance.com for celebrations this year in Menlo Park or Palo Alto.

Gary Anderson has been editor of the venerable Let's Dance! publication for 13 years now, making sure deadlines are met monthly, acting as contributing photographer or author, typesetting content, correcting, coordinating printing and mailing, monitoring costs, and much more. I rejoice at not knowing all the duties he serves as editor in order to get the page you are viewing to you in your hand. We all see the work he does without ever meeting him. But after so many years he is taking off the proverbial green visor as editor and seeking retirement after this issue. Please help me thanking Gary for all he has done behind the scenes for this publication. Loui Tucker will be filling his shoes as editor in coming issues.



The Festival of the Oaks committee has hired a (new to California) charming dance teacher that is not well known in the Bay Area and will bring a fresh array of dances. Sanna Longden, a dance teacher from Evanston, Illinois, focuses on easy dances that have beautiful music and are fun to dance. She has taught to groups in China, Taiwan, Spain, Macedonia, Hungry and many places around the US (NY, Massachusetts, Wisconsin, Michigan, and Utah) and at many folk dance festivals and camps including Stockton, Door County etc.. Eye on Dance by Eileen

Annual North/South Teachers Conference 2016

Erica Goldman and Iliana Bozhanova. I could hug both of our teachers. I did hug both of our teachers. They did exactly as we asked – to include in their classes methods and strategies for teaching folk dance, with the purpose of making us better teachers. In some ways, Erica and Iliana were very much alike. They brought a huge amount of knowledge, passion, and enthusiasm, didn't swamp us with too many dances, and did lots of repetition - perfect for a weekend camp. In other ways, they were very different, as you might imagine with Israeli and Bulgarian dances respectively. I will elaborate.

The conference is held in the hills above Aptos, at the Monte Toyon Retreat Center. As people started trickling in on Friday evening, we started the evening party. Soon critical mass was reached and dance requests came flocking in. The depth and variety of the requests never cease to amaze me – thank you to all who contributed. Each teacher presented a dance. Erica's was more ambitious than Iliana's, but the talented group of dancers coped admirably. And review the next day helped!

The teachers had three classes each, two on Saturday, and one on Sunday. Iliana, and her amazing accordionist, Todor Yankov, started first. Iliana was very clear and direct in her teaching methods. And it was terrific to have a live musician who could stop and start and change the tempo on her instruction. It seems to be a tradition in Bulgaria. When I was there last year, we had many classes and always with live music. It would be nice to have some of that here.

Iliana gave many great tips for teaching beginning dancers - for instance, say toes and shoulders face center, or say don't cut 1/8 of a pie in a pravo, 1/16 is enough. Be précis. She sometimes wears different colored socks for teaching to differentiate left from right. And because some people have more of a problem doing steps with the left foot, to think of your "beautiful left foot." When teaching children, she often just has them clap out rhythms while moving in a circle, and to remind them to be aware of keeping the circle rounded. That wouldn't hurt for adults either! She also said that traditionally women in Bulgaria don't stamp! Really? She said it would be like drawing attention to yourself - i.e. "look at me". That is not in the culture! And don't show the soles of your feet - people will laugh at you. There was other advice specific to different regions or dances, for example there is not much bouncing in the Rodope region, or don't dip in the dance Yuta.

Next came the whirlwind – I mean Erica. She had so much she wanted to say it often came gushing out. As a fellow Brooklynite, I felt right at home. She recommended giving catchy names to steps or a series of steps – e.g. "Broadway" for a step with big jazz hands. Also, use mnemonics, such as "leftovers in the fridge, right under the cheese" – for the proper handhold. She also stressed – and this was the first time I heard this from a teacher – to look happy when you are teaching. Students not only pick up steps from you, but attitude! Great advice! If nothing else, you can create a room full of energy and good vibes.

Erica reminded us that people have different ways of learning, so one time say the count, the next time left, right, left and the next time walk, walk, cha cha cha, or slow, slow quick, etc. But for a hard sequence give a mantra that people will continue to hear in their heads when doing the dance. And of course, gear teaching to your audience – for instance, whether or not they are familiar with the terms, like yemenite, mayim step, etc. She encouraged teachers to end with an easy dance, so peo-

ple will go away feeling successful.

People wanted to know why it seems like they never hold hands anymore in Israeli dancing. Erica explained that the dances have gotten harder and livelier over the years, with lots of turns and the dancers just naturally became disconnected. She said they still hold hands when doing the older dances. Erica also gave a hint on teaching partner dances. These days, people are very aware of the gender issues, e.g. "women's part" or "leader" can be problematic. She calls one partner the "Ericas" and the other partner the "Alans" or "Susans" or whatever the other person's name is.

Both teachers gave excellent culture corner talks. In Iliana's hour, it was Todor's chance to shine. She presented a slide show of beautifully costumed dancers, while Todor demonstrated all the different Bulgarian rhythms with his accordion! There are a lot of rhythms! Iliana mentioned that there has been a big recreational dance movement in Bulgaria over the past decade. She said that some people think that it is only for fitness and they are choreographing their own dances that are not always authentic! Sound familiar? Iliana said she presents many dances that are still done in the villages, but does choreography when "moved by a piece of music." I'm positive that she keeps them authentic!

Erica also had a lot to say about the current happenings in Israeli dancing. She had the opportunity to visit many Jewish summer camps this year. She said there's a big cultural exchange with Israeli students — but the students they assign to do Israeli folk dancing are frequently not actual Israeli dancers. So, they make up dances. Hello again! Those dances are only done in that particular camp — which means there is no bridge to the adult world of Israeli dancing. In that larger Israeli dance world, the dances are getting harder, shorter, and there are more couples dances, also making it hard for beginners to break in. All our groups are struggling with similar problems. Check out more from her at her weebsite, dancewitherica.com.

At the Saturday party, we had the pleasure of dancing to Todor's extraordinary musicianship with Iliana leading many of the dances taught over the weekend and at past workshops. We also had the pleasure of doing a lot of dances with Erica – ones we learned over the years from her and classic Israeli dances. I tried to soak up both women's great styling. It was a delight to have these two talented and passionate teachers for a whole weekend. They will be a tough act to follow.

Thanks to my fellow committee members, Susan Gregory, Marian Earl, Tom Sha, Valerie Daly, and Laura Carman. They are a great bunch of people to work with. Thanks to all the other people who came, and danced, and infused their energy into all the classes and parties. If you are interested in teaching folkdance, please let one of us know so you can get on the invitation list for next year. The more teachers we have, the longer we'll be able to keep our folk dance world vigorous and evolving.





Please note that the description for the dance Marjanka published in the November issue (pp. 17-18) is both incomplete and flawed, and should be ignored.

Marjánka

(Czech Republic)

Marjánka (MAHR-yahn-kah) is a couple dance from central Bohemia. The name means "dearest Marie." It was taught by Jitka Bonušová at the 2016 Stockton Folk Dance Camp. The theme of the dance, as exemplified in Fig. I, is a conversation between a man and woman in which the man tries to convince his girlfriend to come to his house.

Music:

3/4 meter

CD - Czech Folk Dances, Track 2

DVD: 2016 Stockton Folk Dance Camp DVD can be viewed in the library at UOP, or by contacting a

camp participant who purchased it.

Formation: Couples facing and arranged in a circle with M's back to center. M's L hand holds W's R.

Steps:

Triple step: This is a basic 2-step. Step to L on L (ct 1), step on R next to L (ct 2), step on L next to R (ct 3). All steps are light and done on the balls of the feet. Step can be done with opposite footwork, and in place or in any direction, W start with R.

Left Do-Si-Do: Face ptr and, with 4 triple steps, move fwd passing L shoulders with ptr, pass behind

ptr and move backwards passing R shoulders to original place.

Styling:

Partners do opposite footwork throughout the dance. Free hands are placed on hips, fingers forward.

Measures

3/4 meter

PATTERN

2 measures **INTRODUCTION**. No action.

I. TRIPLE STEPS AND TURN.

- 1-3 Dance 3 triple steps, with M starting to L, then to R, and backing up with L back, R fwd and fwd on L. W dances mirror image starting with stepping to R.
- 4-6 Shift handhold with M's R now holding W's L. Three triple steps with M starting to R, then to L, and backing up with R back, L fwd, and fwd on R. W does mirror-image starting with stepping to L.
- 7-8 Holding both hands across, and swinging them gently in direction of movement, dance 2 triple steps, M starts with L to L and W starts to R with R (meas 7), and then in opp direction (meas 8).
- Place hands on hips, turn with 2 triple steps casting away from each other, (M counter-clockwise), 9-11 ending face to face (meas 9-10). Make light stamp or touch in place (M's L, W's R) (meas 11).
- 12-22 Repeat meas 1-11. End in semi-open ballroom hold facing LOD with lead arms almost straight in front.

II. SLOW STEPS, WALTZ, CAST-OFF, FIG. I.

- 1-4 Walk fwd 4 slow and smooth steps starting with M's L, W's R.
- 5-6 In regular ballroom hold, dance two turning waltz steps while moving in LOD.
- 7-8 Cast off away from each other with 2 triple steps (see Fig. I, meas 9-10).
- 9-16 Repeat meas. 1-8.
- 17-24 Repeat Fig. I meas 1-8.

III. WALTZ, CAST-OFF, LEFT DO-SI-DO.


- 1-2 With M's L and W's R, step toward ptr to assume closed ballroom hold (W can do a triple step in place instead of a step) (meas 1); take a second step in place (M's R, W's L) (meas 2).
- 3-6 Dance 2 turning waltz steps moving in LOD (meas 3-4); cast off away from ptr with 2 triple steps, and return to ptr (meas 5-6).
- 7-10 Dance a Left Do-Si-Do with ptr with 4 triple steps.
- 11-18 Repeat meas 3-10.
- 19-20 Repeat meas 3-4 (turning waltz).
- 21-22 M dances in place with 1 **triple step** while turning W to her R with L arm (M's L hand joined to Ws R hand) and the cpl briefly poses.
- 23-24 W steps to R on R (meas 23), step L next to R (meas 24). M stands (hands remain joined).

Repeat dance one more time, but in this second time through the dance it ends with the cpl posing on Fig. III, meas 22.




