President's Message

While flipping through a recently unsealed storage box of dance records I came across an LP whose color cover photo showed a broadly smiling man dressed in a white shirt and wearing a black suit and tie who, snapping his fingers, looked like he was about to kick and drop to his knees in a Russian squat. To his right were two women dressed in colorful party dresses and heels and another



man in a similar suit, all were beaming, applauding at the spectacle. The liner notes read:

"This is music for a once-in-a-lifetime celebration, in the old time Eastern European manner where every night was once in a lifetime!

Here is a Long Playing festival of a rollicking, rhythmic rumpus with rolling drums and tintinnabulating cymbals and a joyous, trilling clarinet that bubbles with the intoxication of a once-in-a-lifetime occasion.

This is music for dancing, for leaping, for laughing, for raising overflowed wine glasses, for loving your neighbor, for merrily kissing his wife and for making him proud that you did. This is music for a happy tonight because tomorrow—tomorrow you might be even happier and you must be fully warmed up to be dancing and leaping and laughing all over again."

(Music for Happy Occasions, Paul Pincus and his Orchestra, Mercury MG 20202, 1956?)

My first reaction was to ask myself who writes this stuff? But who doesn't identify with the infectious joy of dance and losing all sense of decorum given the right music and company. I've often seen the amazing sight of hundreds of people lively participating in contra, English country, international, and zydeco to live music at major festivals such as Seattle's Northwest Folklife Festival. I don't often see leaping at many dance parties I've attended, unless it is a Morris dance performance, but I wouldn't rule out daring cartwheels or back flips either given a level of excitement. The more experienced the dancer just leads to more expressive and amazing dance moves when the passion comes. I can also identify the near weekly dance parties and workshops in particular about Kolo Festival this year precisely have appeared organized to just keep us warmed up to be all dancing and laughing again for the next party, if not leaping as well.

Music sets the mood and tempo of our lives. It is there for joy, excitement, passion, and there in times of meditation, remembrance, or sacred ritual. There's no telling which came first, dance or music, but they are inseparable today in our existence. If you made a New Year's resolution this year there's a good chance exposing yourself to dance and music would help bring the joy, motivation, and health needed to bring the resolution true. Music and dance helps ease pain and stress, improve sleep quality, reduces appetite, anxiety, and

depression, and elevates mood and concentration. It's a remedy the doctor should prescribe again and again, and for which there is no need for a cure.

A big salute to the folk dance organizers and music makers of the last year and to those in the coming year for bringing us the smiles and joy of dance! For your local dance club for finding and bringing dance to a venue near you, of which there are over seventy listed as group members of the Federation North. A big salute to the bands and their members who work hard to play the live music we dance to because we enjoy it when rewards are more personal enrichment than financial. A salute to Lucy Chang and the Moveable Feet Club who pursued and brought us dance workshops with notable instructors over the past year. A salute to Loui Tucker for helping to organize the Officers Ball last year as well as MC many parties. A salute to all the Federation board who help bring the publications, scholarships, events, news, and more to you. And finally a big salute to you for your continued membership and support within the dance community for which all this is worthwhile for another year!

This January 22 and 23, the annual Heritage Festival comes to a new venue in Belmont: the Twin Pines Community Center. A common complaint last year was the scarce parking when participants of an adjacent sports event scored on evening parking. If convenient parking, great floor, nearby restaurants, and Caltrain station a block away are not enough then consider the program. Cesar Garfiez, twice invited as an instructor to Stockton Folk Dance Camp during 2014 and 2015, will be holding a Saturday afternoon Salsa Rueda workshop. An inspiring dance instructor, Cesar has studied many styles of dance and currently is in demand teaching Salsa and Latin dance at Cal Poly Pamona and at studios around Los Angeles. Bring a partner or come by yourself because his teaching style is exciting and infectious and the Salsa music is guaranteed to get you to move! Also, both Friday and Saturday evening parties of the Festival will feature live Balkan dance music with Agapi Mou and Staro Vino. Look for more details in this issue.

Also look for Loui at the Heritage Festival or at several other Federation sponsored events this year and become a superhero by purchasing a t-shirt emblazoned with the saying "I FOLK DANCE – that's my superpower!" Buy it, then change costume into this shirt early for an evening of dancing to win smiles, shield yourself from undue criticism, or simply to have a dry shirt to wear afterward. It comes in mens or ladies fittings in three heroic colors. If you missed giving a gift for Christmas or Hanukkah this year you can still give your friends something to wear by Easter that they'll remember you for. Eye on Dance by EileenA Klezmer Experience

A few months ago I was in New York City for five days, connecting with relatives and old friends. I grew up in Brooklyn and, in some ways, visiting New York stills feels like going home. When I hear the "other coast" accent, I immediately feel a visceral connection to the person speaking. In much the same way, when I hear the strains of Klezmer music, it evokes the music spilling out of Jewish homes in my old neighborhood in Brooklyn. It takes me back the many Jewish weddings and Bar Mitzvahs I attended there in the 50's and 60's. The following events flowed from those feelings.

As it happened, I found myself alone on my last night. What is a folk dancer to do? Look for Balkan music, right? I scanned the Internet and shortly found a listing for a CD kick-off Klezmer concert, to be held in the back room of a Ukrainian restaurant in the East Village. Sounded like my kind of people. I was worried about going by myself, not knowing anyone and sitting alone all night. Putting my fears aside, I got my NY vibe on, headed down into the bowels of the subway, and emerged a few blocks from the venue. NYC really does make San Francisco look like a small town! There were people of every description and ethnicity, walking, biking, driving, eating, shopping, in and out of taxis and ethnic restaurants. It's exhilarating. New York is the future.

I arrived at the restaurant, was directed to the back room, and sat down at an empty table. People filed in, in couples and groups, greeting old friends. Then a few people asked if they could sit at my table. We started talking, and discovered things we had in common – such as neighboring high schools. The band appeared. Their CD was advertised as "The Brothers Nazaroff: The Happy Prince, a boisterous, high-energy tribute to cult Yiddish troubadour Nathan "Prince" Nazaroff, who recorded the mysterious Folkways 10-inch record Jewish Freilach Songs in 1954. International klezmer supergroup The Brothers Nazaroff, composed of Daniel Kahn, Psoy Korolenko, Michael Alpert, Jake Shulman-Ment, Bob Cohen, and Hampus Melin, breathe new life into the discordant, obscure, jubilant legacy of their Happy Prince." The group is also the subject of an upcoming documentary feature film (due out in 2016), which follows them all over the new world and the old, from Quebec to New York to Romania to Paris to Berlin. Some of you might recognize the name Michael Alpert who was originally from Los Angeles. He apparently has been named a national treasure by the NEA. He joked about his wife saying to him "So, national treasure, can you take out the garbage?"

After the band started, a few people got up to dance — in a line. Has there ever been a line that a folk dancer wouldn't want join? No! I joined in and soon I was holding hands with lots of different people. Much of the music was new to me, yet familiar at the same time. When the band took a break, I met lots of people — ones I had been dancing with, some fellow Brooklynites, a few musicians, and inevitably, some folk dancers, (have you been to Golden Fest, I know Michael Ginsburg, do you go to Pinewoods, etc, etc.). The band came back with an even livelier set, more people got up to dance, and general insanity ensued. By the end of the night, we were all hugging, and they were wishing I lived closer. I felt like I had just attended a distant relative's Bar Mitzvah.

I got the following note in an email a few days later, after telling one of my NY friends about the concert -- "It's so great to be able to have a passion like that - you have the ability to take your dancing skills anywhere in the world and meet people who love to dance like you do." I thought about that for a minute, and realized how lucky we are to be folk dancers. Maybe if we could just talk the rest of the world into dancing, we could all hug at the end of the night.

Sidney and Laila Messer

SIDNEY MESSER 1926-2015

Sidney Messer died this past November at the age of 89. Many of you will remember the name Sidney Messer because you sent a check for your Federation membership dues to Sidney for nine years. Sidney was the Chair of the Membership Committee 2000-2009. It was Sidney who brought the Federation into the digital age by moving the membership data to an Excel spreadsheet (from sheets of paper and index cards!).

Sidney began folk dancing with Lucile Czarnowski in the 1940s. After marrying Laila (Federation President 2003-2005) and dropping out of dancing to raise a family, the two of them returned to folk dancing in the 1980s. Sidney and Laila danced primarily with Changs, and Sidney served as President of Changs for six years, from 2000 to 2006.

(editor's note) Sidney was very learned—he wrote a number of articles about the background of folk dancing and the names of dances. I particularly remember "Polorus Jack" and the "Origin of Sprung Dance Floors".

PELORUS JACK (Let's Dance!, 2010

To begin with, we must get a few facts straight. A pelorus is a navigational instrument. It gives bearings of objects relative to magnetic north. The handheld compass has rendered the pelorus obsolete, but it's still a neat instrument. Also, there once was a Mr. Pelorus. He was the local guide, who in 218 BC, led Hannibal and his elephants across the Alps from Spain so as to treat the Romans to a surprise party of sorts. And lastly, the pelorus is not to be confused with a pyloras which is the first part of the lower intestine that sits between the stomach and the duodenum. I don't believe anyone has ever been that confused but you never know.

Now I can begin. There is a body of water in New Zealand known as Cooks Strait. It is an area full of treacherous currents and ragged rocks, the likes of which you have to see to believe. It was a dark and stormy morning in 1871, a sailing vessel, the Brindle was having trouble getting through the strait when a strange white Risso's dolphin leaped out of the strait when a strange white Risso's dolphin leaped out of the water and proceeded to keep up with the vessel. The crew on board wanted to harpoon it but the captains' wife suggested they follow it instead because it seemed to know where it was going, while they didn't. It turned out the dolphin knew a lot more about where the rocks and currents were than they did.

On the return trip the dolphin was there again, showing them the way, this time in the opposite direction. Word spread quickly and it wasn't long before ships trying to navigate those wild waters would actually wait for the dolphin to arrive so they could follow him through the pass. They named him Pelorus Jack after their most useful navigational instrument. And so began a most remarkable relationship between man and beast that lasted some forty years.

Pelorus Jack seemed to prefer steam ships, they moved faster. Within a year or two he became famous and was eventually seen by thousands of people. It wasn't unusual for tourists to take the ferry trip between Wellington and Nelson just to watch him frolicking around the boat. He was described widely in newspapers and on postcards. There was never a single recorded instance of a mishap to any vessel guided by Pelorus Jack. On one notable occasion, however, a drunken and armed passenger aboard the ship named the Penguin, took a shot at Pelorus Jack and hit him.

The crew became furious as they saw Jack moving away with blood pouring from his body. A lynching was very narrowly avoided. Vessels, meanwhile, had to navigate the channel on their own for the next few weeks until one day Pelorus Jack reappeared, apparently recovered from his wound.

On September 26, 1904, the New Zealand government passed an Order in Council under the Sea Fisheries Act, officially protecting Jack's life. He is probably the first individual sea creature ever to be protected in this way.

Jack returned to the area, continuing to meet and escort every steamer that approached, except if and when the Penguin appeared he was nowhere to be found. Some years later, (1909) the Penguin sank with a loss of 75 lives which makes one wonder about the prevailing belief that misfortune comes to anyone who harms a dolphin.

Jack disappeared in 1912 hopefully due to old age, but his memory remains to this day. His story has been told in more than one song. A reel titled Pelorus Jack, written by Auklander Barry Skelton in 1993, was recognized by the Royal Society of Scottish Country Dancing and has become a popular dance in many parts of the world. The dance is composed of four couples, three of whom do not move, but rather maintain a stationary position. They represent the rocks off cook strait. The fourth couple however is moving, one behind the other. They represent Pelorus Jack leading a ship around these "treacherous rocks".

Until the dance is properly learned, there are many near misses, some collisions, and occasionally a dreadful sinking. You don't want to be there when that happens.



There exists in my archives some old Folk-News magazines from 1936! This particular one is No. 91, from September 1, 1936. They were published in New York City. They came out two times a month. It was 8 1/2 x 11", with 8 to 12 pages, stapled in the middle. I have reduced the size of these images to get them in. The December issue had a full column of dance events.

Note that the dance events are often connected to ethnic organizations. Articles in the magazines are not solely about folk dancing, They are often about the dress and customs of the various communities. This particular issue has a two page spread of pictures of national costumes. There is no reference to the couple on the cover.
