President's Message

The dog days of summer have turned tail. Days are getting shorter and the chill of autumn will bring color to the leaves soon. With each day we are more thoughtful of the approaching holidays. And to take our coat before leaving the house.

Someone once told me that festivals and concerts seem to flood the early days of Fall be-



cause organizers suddenly realize that once December comes around people have already decided their holiday schedule until the year end. This reasoning seems to make sense among many people I know. Nevertheless, most the festivals and concerts I attend that occur annually between August and November are planned a week to the day of when it was held the year before. There are the community art and wine, or blues and beer festivals with artisan crafts for sale, BBQ festival fare, bands, bounce houses and kid activities. In the Bay Area there are also the specialty food festivals such as the Garlic, Chocolate, Bacon, Tamale, Mole and Mariachi, or Taco and Tequila festivals. It's worth mentioning however that for time immemorial this period was celebrated by cultures of all origins and customs worldwide as the time of the harvest feast. It is a natural time for frequent celebrations.

By far the festival of my choice are the world culture festivals featuring traditional music, dance, and food. Often organized by an ethnic church or organization, these celebrations are staffed by community volunteers who are happy to share their art and culture. Here are a list of 10 ethnic festivals in the Bay Area and Northern California that occur from August through October. All feature authentic traditional cuisine, a bazaar, and dance in traditional costumes:

Greek Festivals (Belmont, Santa Cruz, Castro Valley). Drama and dance performances, spirits, and dancing to spirited live Greek music as well. Opa!

Russian & International Festival (Saratoga). Flavored vodka sampling, dancing to live entertainment.

Lebanese Festival (Redwood City). Traditional dancing to live music in the center of Courthouse Square!

Assyrian Food Festival (San Jose). Wine bar, traditional pastries and cafe, heritage exhibits, youth and teen dance performances, and live band for dancing. This year the band was from LA.

PolskaFest (San Jose). Polish culture celebration with traditional music, song, and dance performances. Polish music by DJ throughout the festival.

Fiestas Patrias and Tamale Festival (San Jose). Fiestas Patrias is a September Mexican holiday celebration with ballet folklorico dancing. The Tamale Festival is a separate Latino heritage event held in August with tamale competition, food, music, and performances.

Turkish Festival (Monterey). Live traditional music, folk dancing, youth and adult dance performances, and belly dancing at the historic Custom House Plaza.

Aloha Races & Polynesian Festival (Santa Cruz). Outrigger canoe races, arts and crafts, live traditional music, Hula and Polynesian dance performances.

Diwali Festival (Cupertino). The Indian festival of lights celebration with traditional dance and music performances.

Mehregan Celebration (Cupertino). Traditional Persian dance and music performances.

Most these celebrations feature recreational folk dance to live music as well as performances. What better place to experience dance and learn culture than from people of another heritage!

For example, between dances at the Assyrian festival this year I sat to talk culture with a volunteer while she ate four consecutive slices of sticky baklava. She answered some questions about her background with the festival then gave me a lead to an exhibit staffed by a volunteer not occupied with eating baklava who was more than happy to talk about Assyrian heritage. Similarly, other festivals have people who enjoy answering questions on their culture and will pose for a picture with you too. Or just ask any booth operator who looks idle.

The Turkish festival in Monterey has particularly friendly people, and animals too in the case of an unique breed of Turkish dog on show by a booth. Also, often when dancing with the "naturals" at these events I find myself complimented upon my dance technique and experience, even if I just picked up the dance pattern there. Sometimes that compliment is not spoken for me to understand first in English. Nevertheless, dance and music is always our universal language to share the joyful, creative expression that you'll find at many ethnic festivals.

No better way to enjoy folk dance in our community than to organize our own celebration of ethnic dance. The Officer's Ball 2016 is coming to Palo Alto this October 15. Entitled "Joining Hands Through the Decades" it combines an afternoon folk dance workshop, dinner, and evening dance review and party. Attending the entire celebration from the workshop start at 1:30 pm to party end at 10:30 pm with on-site dinner is less than \$40.Discover the wonderful experience and creative talent of so many volunteers who make this event a great success.

We've used many of your suggestions to improve small details for this next Officer's Ball. I also have a suggestion for patrons: purchase a Federation logo t-shirt from Loui at the Ball. The t-shirt is an attractive investment to replace or cover up any garment with self-inflicted chili, salad dressing, or other entrée stains during the evening meal. Or keep the shirt handy if your neighbor passes dessert to you with an unsteady hand (you remember who you are, neighbor).

Read on for more details including surprise Officer's Ball feature additions within this issue or online at folk-dance.com. Register early for this wonderful annual event. I'll see you there!


History Corner

A FEW FACTS AND A FEW THOUGHTS ON FOLK DANCING

How old is folk dancing? As old as the human race. People have always danced for one reason or another. But how old is our type of folk dancing for fun, for recreation? In California, we started in 1938, but the dances we are doing and learning are often centuries old. (Of course, some were only born yesterday, but we could hardly call these folk dances.)

Why do we folk dance? Why don't we sit at home and look at TV or play cards or go to a movie or a bar? Because we have found through folk dancing that it is more pleasure to participate than to be a spectator, more enjoyable to move than to sit. We found in folk dancing a common ground on which to meet in an informal way other people and we get along and appreciate each other as human beings irrespective of our political or religious affiliations. We found that through folk dancing we are losing our inhibitions and learn to be relaxed, tol be at ease and natural. We found in folk dancing a creative outlet so badly needed in our world of routine existence and high pressure.

Letter from a scholarship recipient: I'm in love . . .

Sunday I checked into this place, Stockton, you know? Monday night I thought it had been Tuesday. Tuesday evening we gathered for pictures and I was deeply struck by how close I was to a lot of these people already, friendly with so many others, and how quickly we would all go different ways again.

This was a nearly perfect microcosm in which we all had our work to do, or were on our way to eat our choices of good food with nice new friends so that we could do more work. ("Work" here refers to dancing.) Everybody seemed to be into walking in long hallways, sharing friendly greetings, brushing their teeth, opening and closing stair doors on their way to or from "work", trying to drink enough water, taking in nice presentations, and generally participating in high-quality down-to-earth people time.

There was lots of good teaching, and that there were choices made my days joyously full. Some things that added to my appreciation of my favorite teachers were the humor of one, the exhilarating jubilance of another, and another's finely-honed understanding of the students' perspective and capabilities.

This week kicked me further along the path of becoming more tolerant of, if they exist, dancers who may not be quite as adept as some others. Already enjoying such a satisfying social experience and dancing to my heart's content, a teacher demonstrated fretting too much over your partner's stance instead of just enjoying that you're dancing. Ten seconds of comical brilliance, at a key time.

The live band was of the utmost quality. The musicians and their instruments were one.

I thank the staff for their loads of work in arranging this rich experience for all of us.

Sunday I decided to leave home. Okay, actually, camp was over and I was merely complying. One of the best gol' darn weeks of my life. Through the following week I wore my name badge when dancing, to help ease the transition.

Eye on Dance by Eileen

Stockton 2016

Opa! This was my dream year at Stockton – the triple play of Joe, Ahmet, and Steve. Thank you to the committee for reading my mind and appealing to my heart with Greek, Turkish, Albanian, and Macedonian dances. Included in the program were other wonderful dance genres and teachers, including Norwegian, Czech, and Vintage. Stockton continues to be the ultimate camp for lovers of all types of dancing. If your feet can't be happy during a week on that gorgeous campus, then there is no pleasing you!

The activities started out on Sunday evening with a helpful and informative orientation meeting for all - not just for the twenty-six new campers from across the globe! Our intrepid director, Jeff O'Connor, was very pleased to announce that we had the largest attendance at camp in many years! Hopefully, ahem, the committee will make note of the teachers that drew in the crowds. After the teachers, the band, the committee, and numerous volunteers were introduced, the chairs were swept away in an instant and a dance party followed. Each teacher presented an easy dance as a way of introduction, so you could possibly plan what your schedule for the week could evolve into. Good luck! Be advised - you cannot do everything - even for those of us who stayed for two weeks. It was so hard to choose, especially in the afternoons, when classes weren't repeated. No matter what you did, you couldn't go wrong. All the classes were great.

I will start with Joe Graziosi, because it has been awhile since Greek dancing was part of the schedule. My Wednesday AM Greek dance group (join us in Montclair) is always looking for new dances. And did we ever get a juicy bunch! Joe said he teaches dances of the Greeks, not Greece. There are or were Greeks in many places, including Turkey, Albania, Georgia, Bulgaria, and Southern Italy. He reminded us that the dances are very regional, i.e. mainland versus island, etc. I love his flourishes and embellishments - where a lift can also be a touch or a pas-de-bas, so you can express how you are feeling in the moment. There are subtleties in Greek dancing that reach my inner bliss center. I can't decide if Ksipna Perdhikomata, Kotsakia, or Sofka was my favorite. I loved all the others too. The tune for Tessera Matia Dhio Kardhies became an ear-worm (in a good way) and lulled me to sleep many nights (or should I say mornings). Sorry Joe, for all the teasing you got for your Boston accent!

I can hardly talk about Ahmet Luleci without bringing up his lovely assistant, Evren Soytopcu Kiyak, who, in addition to showing the women's styling in Ahmet's classes, also had her own workshops in the afternoon. She has been in professional dance troupes and completed her master teacher diploma in 2007. I know she was initially nervous about her lack of English, but by the middle of the first week, you could see her confidence grow. She blossomed. And with the beautiful styling and tons of talent that she has, she didn't need much English! The dances she taught were very popular and many people mentioned that they would love to have her back. Even just to do more belly dance styling. Just watching her hands was a treat. Al Basmadan, Roman Kizi, Elmalarin Yongasi, and Lacin were favorites, and were requested frequently at the

after parties.

As some of you know, I have been to Turkey on dance trips with Ahmet the last three years, so I might be a bit biased here. Obviously, I love everything about Turkey (see last month's Let's Dance!), and the new dances Ahmet introduced were no exception. He injects lots of humor into his classes, which almost makes you forget that you are doing a lot of hard work. Amongst the laughs, there is a lot of information, detail, and styling tips. He said dancing is about you, not about the dance, that he picks out the dance leaders of the villages he researches for the styling, but everyone in the village is different, from body shape to emotions. Let your emotions come out while dancing! Which many people did when doing the heartbreaking dance Ahmedum. Ahmet also advised to stay close to the person on your right, and don't break up the line. In Turkey that is disrespectful to the leader. Don't be afraid to get close! Especially in Helef.

This might be a good place to praise a group of unsung heroes - the Dance Research Committee. You can see them sitting and watching classes with an eagle eye, furiously writing and consulting each other. There has been much discussion about why we need notes in this technological age, when we have videos. I have been convinced, after talking to many people, that the notes are valuable, especially as a quick reference and in the future when other forms of media might break down. Plus they contain other information about the dances, like translations of the lyrics, etc. And I actually did refer to the notes on a few occasions, since I was teaching several dances before the Stockton video was sent out. There is a great explanation by Loui at the beginning of the 2016 Syllabus page about the value of notes. The notes keep us all on the same page, so to speak. Big thanks to Martha Awdziewicz, Laura Carman, Karen Bennett, Bill Lidicker, Tom Sha, Joyce Lissant Uggla, Karen Wilson Bell and Loui Tucker.

Steve Kotansky, with his wife Susan (to show the women's styling), taught a buffet of dances from Albania, Macedonia, Bulgaria, Romania, and Hungary. The couple worked very well together - she keeping him on track, as he has a tendency during class to impart his reams of fascinating information about the dances. Steve had lots of interesting tidbits and quotes about dancing and the cultures of all the countries he has been to. One local piece of color was from rocker Steve Tyler. Steve had the occasion to see a sign on his wall saying, "If you trip and fall make it part of the dance." Another choice quote (from Martha Graham) is "Practice is a means of inviting the perfection desired." Steve stressed that all his dances are "living dances" - meaning the steps are all being done in the original countries, but some patterns may be arranged to fit a particular piece of music. Come to Piedmont on Friday nights. We are already doing some of his Stockton dances, like Ihtimanska Kopanica and Vallja E Malenakes.

The popular Jitka Bonusova brought her lively personality and great Czech dances back to Stockton this year. Jitka is a graduate of the Film and Musical Arts Academy and the Folk Dance Conservatory, both in Prague. She has been dancing for more than 30 years, having danced with Beseda dance group. The equally popular Alix Cordray was back for her sixth stint at Stockton. She taught Norwegian dances and brought with her a delightful young partner named Simon Lovald. Thanks to Evan Chu for donating miles to fly him

(and Evren) to camp. I spoke to a few people who only went to Jitka and Alix's classes, with some of Richard and the Byars thrown in. You can totally lead shadow lives at Stockton by day, yet still interact at night.

Richard refers to Richard Powers, who has taught at Stockton eleven times! Northern Californians know him from his role of historian and social dance teacher at Stanford. He brought a lovely partner, Melissa Carvell, which turned out well, as her fiancée stayed an extra week to partner with Jitka! When I think about it now, there was a lot of partnering up — on the dance floor of course! Richard's dances were such fun, especially the Lambeth Walk and the dreamy Tango Fascination. He also gave an interesting Culture Corner, with his students learning respect for others, listening skills, and quick adaptation, through dance. And his Children of All Ages class was like a master class in teaching beginners. He is amazing in his scope and we are lucky to have him in the area.

Scott and Erin Byars were the square dance and round dance callers respectively. Round dancing was something new (at least lately) to Stockton and was quite fun. Scott had a unique approach to the nightly squares, getting in and amongst the sets, singing, and helping where necessary - and it was often necessary. He had some tricky moves up his sleeves for the novice square dancer, and music that certainly didn't come from the Jerry Helt archives. The Byars did a gorgeous dance at the second week Talent Show, with Scott being so gracious and playful with Erin, who has a few challenges health-wise. There were many people wiping their eyes after that performance.

Let's get on to the fun stuff. Like the fabulous band! California Kapela, led by Susan Worland, was back, with Evan Stuart, Rumen Sali Shopov (who also taught the singing class), Hristo Mollov, and Ivan Milev. They played every night before OOL (Once Over Lightly), learned many of the dances taught and, if you were up late, you could hear them jamming in the courtyard. Sali, with Murray, Randi, and Jeff also led sing-a-longs each week, which was a treat. There were many other ways to spend your days — going to various workshops if you still had the energy, shopping at the new camp boutique at any hour, attending the wine and cheese reception and auction, going to the time capsule of 70's dances, or just trying to find the time for a nap! With the packed schedule, good luck!

Naps are welcome if you want to attend the after-parties, which follow OOL. Because they are all-request affairs, and run by a different camper every night (thank you to my Turkish twin Marion for the help), each night had its own flavor. Certain dances tend to become popular and get requested nightly. It's been interesting to watch those change from year to year. "Old" dances that our current line-up of teachers taught over the years were very popular, and it was great to see them done by the original teachers. Dancing next to Joe during Dipat was a highlight. I just wish we could somehow better integrate all those chatting, eating and drinking people outside, with the dancers inside. With each dance, the participants change, as outside people rush in for a favorite dance and inside people rush out to finish conversations! It would be nice to meet in the middle somewhere!

Wednesday and Saturday were review days – meaning party nights. The theme for the Wednesday parties was Hawaiian. It was a huge pleasure to see Nora Nuckles and

Merilyn Gentry back, and organizing a lot of fun activities and surprises throughout the evening, to island-costumed campers. People do like any excuse to dress up – and where better than camp, where every crazy thing is acceptable. Make that desirable! The theme for the first week's banquet was classic movie musicals. People dressed as a character in their favorite movie. Kudos to all the creativity out there, the gorgeous ball gowns, the Johnny Depp pirate look-alike, Groucho, and my fellow Blues Brother! The second week's theme was very different - Balkan. The Stockton crowd has definitely been on many overseas travels, attested to by the gorgeous authentic costumes. I also saw many Stocktonian costumes, elements from a mishmash of different countries, which would make ethnic people blanch, but fine for the Bulgrecians or Crocedonians. All the food was delicious and catered to the wide range of individual diets. It will also be the 70th Anniversary, so there will be lots of surprises! Methinks France will not be traveling alone, for one.

Thanks to all my great friends for their support — you know who you are. Thanks to John Filcich for being my waltz partner. 












THE FEDERATION OFFICERS BALL IS JUST AROUND THE CORNER!

The accompanying graphic is of the printed admission ticket for the 1976 Treasurer's Ball, an annual custom that was already over 25 years old (that's Al Lisin in the center). Back then, the \$2 paid by participants was just the beginning. There was usually a raffle with coveted prizes (a bread machine! an embroidered Russian quilt!), a costume sale, and door prizes. The Treasurer's Ball raised a significant amount of money each year for the Federation. When Page Masson (Federation Treasurer 1988 to 2002) stepped down, the tradition of a Treasurer's Ball held each November ended.

In December of 2010, Loui Tucker decided to try to revive the concept of a fall fund raiser and organized the President's Ball. Instead of an afternoon of dancing to a pre-printed schedule of folk dances and squares, five teachers were invited to teach, there was an on-site dinner, and an on-the-spot-requests party in the evening. The following year it was renamed the Officers Ball by Lucy Chang. The venue has changed from year to year, but the structure has remained the same. Now in its seventh year....

Winds on the Tor

(a "World" dance)

This circle dance was taught by Steve Kotansky at the Sunday night party on 17 July 2016 at Stockton Folk Dance Camp as the date coincided with the First Annual World Sacred Circle Dance Day. It was choreographed by the Glastonbury Tor (England) Circle Dance Group to the tune "The Young Brown Cow." There are many versions of a dance of the same name on YouTube, dating back to 2010. Steve called it a "world" dance as it was chosen for World Sacred Circle Dance Day (see www.globalcircle.dance/video-winds-on-the-tor-english.html). YouTube research indicates the dance is done in many countries, including England, Germany, Brazil and Chile. This version of the music employs an Irish tune, Chinese and Irish musical instruments, and steps that are Western European and Israeli.

Formation:	Circle, hands joined in V-pos, facing slightly R of ctr. (Some "sacred circle" groups do it as a solo dance with scarves and/or additional arm motions.)
Video:	www.youtube.com/watch?v=fFVVmPqxB4k. (As a special-occasion party dance, it does not appear on the 2016 SFDC DVD.)
Rhythm:	3/4 meter.
Steps and Styling:	$\underline{\text{Waltz Step}}$: Three smooth traveling steps done in waltz rhythm. May beg with R or L.
	<u>Crossover Step</u> : Three steps in waltz rhythm facing ctr, with first step crossing in front, second step in place, and third step beside second step. May beg with R or L.

Measures	3/4 meter	PATTERN	
		<u>ON</u> . No action during sound of "wind blowing on the tor" (about 10 meas of solo tin whistle. Begin when guitar joins the melody.	
1-2	Facing R of ctr, do two Waltz Steps fwd (cts 1-6).		
3-4	Still traveling in LOD, do one Waltz Step turning CW once around, releasing hands and raising arms high in air (cts 1-3); facing ctr, do one Crossover Step in place, beg L crossing in front of R, and resume V-pos handhold (cts 4-6).		
5-6	Take one Waltz Step fwd into ctr, raising arms parallel to floor (cts 1-3); take one Waltz Step bkwd to place, lowering arms (cts 4-6).		
7-8	Do two Crossover Steps in place, beg R crossing in front of L (cts 1-6). The last two steps (R, L) are done while turning to face R.		

Sequence: Repeat as written above until end of music.


